After an introit from the choir and to the strains of "Lift high the cross", Bishop Ross Bay and Archdeacon Carol Hughes led Louise and numbers of clergy from the local area into the church. They were greeted by a large congregation who readily gave affirmation to the appointment of Louise as Vicar, and gave praise and thanks to God for the exhaustive and patient work of the nominators – Archdeacon Carol Hughes for the diocese and Celia Finn, Juli Mercer and John Priestley for the Parish.

Louise, assisted by the wardens, James Parkinson and Juli Mercer, received presentations from parishioners, symbolic of the worship, work and life of the parish, and gave her the opportunity to commit to the future health and welfare of the parish and beyond in all its wide diversity. A token of affection and support was made to Louise with the presentation of a votive candle for her own personal use.

In his address, Bishop Ross reminded us that we are all responsible for the needs of the Parish and the wider community; the work is not for the vicar alone. With reference to the day's Bible reading from Romans 12:20, "If your enemy hungers, feed him, if he thirsts, give him drink", he related the story of Henare Taratoa, a Christian leader who was involved in the Maori victory over the British forces at Gate Pa near Tauranga. He carried the "Orders of the day" outlining the agreed conduct from both sides in battle, which also included the biblical words quoted above. His compatriot, a young woman, Heni Karamu, was inspired by his words and, at great risk to her own life, carried water to the British wounded lying on the battlefield.

The service concluded with prayers and a beautiful response in te reo sung by Celia Finn and repeated by the congregation, and a final hymn, "Christ be our light".

Those present were invited to stay for afternoon tea and an opportunity to further celebrate the occasion.

Maintenance Update

The Maintenance Team has been busy as always.

ANZAC weekend saw most of the three days spent on site working to clear the hall ceiling of old heating gear, and upgrading the floodlighting in the Church.

In the last few weeks new lights have been installed in the hall. The previous set of lights proved highly disappointing. Over only five years, 9 out of 15 failed completely. For some time now the hall has been limping along with the remaining four lights. Prior to their removal some light intensity readings were taken and light levels in the darker areas of the hall floor were not much more than a clear night with a full moon! Due to work commitments some of the team could not be present, but a technically-minded family member who enjoys this sort of work kindly stepped in. This was all the more commendable as this relative isn't a St Aidan's parishioner.

The job of taking down old lights and putting up new ones took two full days. That was stage one done.

Stage two concerned installing the dimming circuit which involved getting up into the ceiling, running wires out over the full length of the ceiling and connecting the lights into the dimmer circuit. The dust and cobwebs won't be described here but were completely as expected after 55 years!

Finally, late on that Sunday afternoon, the dimmer unit was installed to the left of the hall main entrance doors and the moment came to turn the power on. It was pleasing beyond words to operate the dimmer and see every light go up and down in brightness according to which button was pressed.

And then it was tidy up, round up tools, clear floor of wire & insulation scraps and head home for a well earned cuppa. The Team sincerely hopes that this set of lights last considerably longer than the previous set.

What else is there? Well, the hot water boiler in the hall kitchen tried our patience once too often. After failing for the umpteenth time, we had HAD ENOUGH. Earlier in the year an eye was kept on Trademe for a suitable replacement and eventually one was advertised. Our bid was successful and a trip made to Albany to pick it up. Being an older model, it was much better made and can be repaired if required. The current boiler in the hall kitchen was removed with little trouble and the "new" one installed. As expected, the water pipes didn't match up but a rummage through a box at home turned up suitable braided flexible replacements.

Lyn explained that the wooden beams were more fireresistant than the usual steel ones. WEF made a donation to the project of \$340 from the year's koha and the evening's trading table. It was suggested this may be used to help purchase equipment for the kitchen.

These were hooked up, some electrical safety checks done and it was time to power it up. It was highly satisfying to hear water run into boiler and the element start to rumble as the water warmed up.

Anything else? Well yes, quite a number of jobs could be mentioned but only one more will be discussed for this issue of the magazine.

With the church exterior being painted recently, it was necessary to remove the clear protective covers over the stained glass windows. A month ago the Team turned up on a brisk Saturday morning to start up the scissor lift the painting company had kindly left an extra day for us to access the window covers.

Except... it was not on site. A miscommunication meant that it had been taken to another job and we had to use a ladder to reach the windows. To say this was inconvenient is a huge understatement.

However there was no alternative as the painting team were starting on the church exterior in the next few days so it was out with the ladder and start removing the screws holding covers in place.

We reinstated the covers on 7th August. This time around the scissor lift was on site and ready to use. Or so we thought. In fact we couldn't get it started. We tried this and that, turned that switch, pressed this button but no good. What on earth was wrong – flat battery? The answer was trivial: a key-switch had to be turned backwards to enable the machine controls. Ha! Obvious, really. With that sorted we were underway.

Any other jobs? Yes, of course. But due to the length of this article, details will be left for the next issue of this magazine.

Charitable Purposes Group

Every year the takings from the Mission Shop are donated to various charitable causes.

The agencies which received grants for the 2021 year are listed below together with an outline of the work that they do.

NZ Church Missionary Society: an independent, evangelical mission organization seeking to mobilise the Church in Aotearoa New Zealand to extend Christ's Kingdom throughout the world, especially in the Asia Pacific region.

Anglican Missions: represents the Anglican Church in Aotearoa New Zealand and Polynesia, and works to enable the three tikanga Māori, Pākehā, Pasifika Church to pursue and share in overseas mission activities.

Auckland City Mission: provides support, housing, medical, counselling and social services to marginalized Aucklanders including families and individuals in crisis and in desperate need.

Anglican Trust for Women and Children: through its family, early education and social work services, the Trust is committed to investing in Auckland's children and helping mothers to build happy, healthy futures for their families.

Habitat for Humanity Curtain Bank: Habitat for Humanity holds a vision of a world where everyone has a decent place to live. The Curtain Bank gives low-income Auckland families free, double-lined, full-length curtains as a way of keeping a home warm and healthy and greatly reducing energy bills.

Christian Broadcasting Association: uses top rating, secular, commercial radio to communicate the essentials of the Christian Faith, aiming to reach audiences who might never set foot inside a church.

Interchurch Council for Hospital Chaplaincy: offers spiritual care to all within Aotearoa New Zealand healthcare, showing a compassion that fuels hope and peace amid suffering. There are 9 partner churches working in co-operation with the Ministry of Health and the District Health Boards. 47 hospitals are covered by 91 chaplains and 300 volunteer chaplaincy assistants.

People at Risk Solutions: formerly known as the Prisoner Aid & Rehabilitation Society, PARS works with people who are at risk of, or are already engaging with the Justice System. This includes people who are about to be, or have been released from prison, deportees, youth at risk and their families. PARS provides a range of housing, employment, wellbeing, education, cultural

identity and mentoring services at a critical time in the transition back to society. These services are delivered to 5 prisons in the Northern Region.

Christians against Poverty: works with local churches to release New Zealanders from debt and poverty. The organization aims to help people budget, save and prevent debt by teaching wise money management and by giving them the tools to take control of their finances.

Prison Chaplaincy Services: a charitable trust responsible for the management of prison chaplains who provide religious and spiritual services to prisoners in New Zealand prisons. PCSANZ is governed by a Board, under contract to the Department of Corrections, and comprising 8 different Church denominations. Bishop Richard Wallace is the board member representing the Anglican Church of Aotearoa New Zealand.

Past Vicars Remembered

I can go back to 1983 when our family first came to St Aidan's and Roy Everall was Vicar. Roy and Briar were a lovely family couple who lived in our old Vicarage and Roy was a very humble man. They led the Bethel series which taught me how God leads and guides us through life. Moses' life and faith in God is a wonderful example in difficult circumstances.

Vicar number 2: Soon after Roy Everall came Harvey and Christine Smith. They had a lovely daughter Nicola who unfortunately suffered with cystic fibrosis. We as a Parish learnt a lot about this nasty lung disease. I remember her carrying an oxygen cylinder into Church to help her breathing. Nicola was so full of life and shared her faith with many she met in her regular trips to youth group and hospital. By this stage our new vicarage was built and that's where Nicola died at around 20 years of age. We all shared her family's grief.

Vicar number 3: Michael and Janine Smart. Originally Michael was from the south island and was known for his teaching. He gave us very good sermons and he and Janine worked as a great team. He helped me in a

difficult time in my life as he was a trained Counsellor. While Michael and Janine were at St Aidan's, Jo Kelly-Moore was studying at St Johns College and came to St Aidan's to begin as a Curate. She eventually became our next Vicar with her husband Paul, and two boys Adam and Nathan. They were a very popular family as Paul helped with Pastoral Care. Jo then went on to become Dean of Holy Trinity Cathedral Auckland and, as most know now, she is Archdeacon of Canterbury and a canon residentiary of Canterbury Cathedral in the United Kingdom.

Di Woods followed on as Vicar after Jo. Di had a background in Army and Airforce also as Vicar in Taradale. She has great energy and enthusiasm for life. Di encouraged us to get involved in various aspects of Church life. In particular the Alpha Course, Homegroups, Prayer Groups, Home Communion whatever suited our gifts. I am very grateful for her encouragement.

Most of us know Glen Ashworth for ourselves so I won't go on!!

Vaughan Park

St Aidan's has many connections with Vaughan Park Anglican Retreat & Conference Centre.

At the August AAW meeting, Lesley Snyman, Director of Vaughan Park for the last two years, was the speaker. With prior marketing and fundraising experience as an airline loyalty programme organiser in South Africa, Lesley works at fundraising, encouraging supporter memberships and was keen to promote what she described as one of Auckland's best kept secrets – Vaughan Park Anglican Retreat & Conference Centre.

I first heard of it when as a new parishioner Rev'd Michael Smart was encouraging everyone to join in the annual church picnic, that year to be held at Long Bay. Vaughan Park adjoins the Long Bay Regional Park. I was intrigued to know that St Aidans has many historical connections with Vaughan Park, aside from several of our vicars participating in retreats there at various stages of their faith journey. Di Woods had one of our Alpha Weekends there. Justice John Priestley was Chair of the Board, 2002 to 2011 and has a meeting room there named after him. Lynne Trenwith was Chair of the Bi-Cultural Trust Board working closely with the Director for over four years halfway through her ten year stint on the Diocesan Board. Rev'd Anne Priestley stayed there for courses many times during her training. Preordination training days are held there too. I am sure there are many others of us with stories to tell about their connections with Vaughan Park.

Vaughan Park has developed into a multi-purpose venue with chapel, conference and hospitality facilities. With 39 beds, four meeting rooms, and two full time chefs it can cater for up to 120 visitors per day, and Rev'd Anne Priestley later told me she had experienced more when conferencing Marae style as the venue is a partnership resource of the Diocese of Auckland and Te Pihopatana o Te Tai Tokerau. An annual scholarship aiming at developing creativity is also supported. The University commonly books it for post graduate workshops in writing theses. Most clergy will have also experienced time there. The Vaughan Park Mission and Vision is 'to portray our Faith in all we do'. Daily office is offered three times to all by the only on-site resident worker, Reverend Sapati Tima, who lives there with his wife and three children.

Last year, with COVID, Vaughan Park operated at a huge loss, but thankfully they were able to retain all nine of their full-time staff.

If you are looking for a quick holiday break close to Auckland, Vaughan Park is just a short drive over the Harbour Bridge then follow signs to Long Bay Regional Park. Perfect for singles, couples or families – see their website for bookings: www.vaughanpark.nz.

Christine thanked Lesley at the end of her talk, and Lesley in turn thanked the meeting for their generous donation. Recently some trees have fallen down and our welcome offering would be used to replace them.



Flourless Peanut Butter & Choc Chip Cookies



Ingredients

1 cup (269g) smooth peanut butter 3/4 cup (161g) brown sugar, packed 1/2 teaspoon baking soda pinch of salt

1 large egg

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 cup (85g) chocolate chips or mini chips

Method

Preheat your oven to 180°C / 350°F.

Beat the peanut butter, sugar, baking soda, and salt at medium speed of your mixer, until well-blended. Add the egg and vanilla, and blend on low-medium speed until incorporated. Stir in the chocolate chips.

Scoop the dough by the tablespoonful onto a lined baking tray and push the dough to flatten slightly.

Bake the cookies for approx. 8 to 10 minutes, removing them from the oven before they begin to brown on the edges.

Cool on the tray.




