### **Maintenance Team**

It is very rare that a week goes by without one of our Maintenance Team members being on site to fix, replace, or consult, on one thing or another.

As I'm sure you know, during 2024 we have had some major works undertaken with the Gathering Area kitchen refurbishment and retrofit, and the conversion of the old burned-out shell of the Hall men's toilets into three aesthetically functional unisex toilets and cleaner's facilities, by Stryde Projects.

What you may not have thought about was the huge amount of hours our own people also put into the oversight, equipment selection and purchase, finishing touches, and money saving extras which allowed us to complete the project well within the budget.

Another large project this year has been the repair and strengthening of the front garden rock wall along Ascot Avenue and Remuera Road. Over 40 bags of quick-mix cement was used to shore it up and bring it back to its original glory.

As is usually the case with older buildings, there is always something wearing out which needs fixing. Door handles, signage, toilets which won't flush or keep running, water leaks, lights, roof leaks, electrical, and much more, are on the maintenance list each and every week for our team to perform repairs and replacements.

Without the amazing hard work and expertise of our Maintenance Team we would not be able to operate as we do, and our maintenance budget would be a great deal higher.

Special thanks to John, David, Simon L, Stuart, Simon HP, James, Andrew, and Keith, for their precious time and hard work throughout the year. Your ministry does not go unnoticed. **†**

## **Christmas Recipes**

#### Orange Marmalade Glaze for Baked Ham

#### INGREDIENTS

- Orange marmalade 1 cup
- Orange juice freshly squeezed 1/2 cup
- Brown sugar 1/4 cup
- Dijon mustard 2 Tbsp
- Ground ginger 1 Tbsp

#### METHOD

Place marmalade, orange juice, sugar, mustard and ginger in a small saucepan over high heat, whisk to combine.

Bring to the boil and cook, stirring for 5 minutes or until melted & slightly thickened.

#### **Sparkling Melon Spritzer**

#### INGREDIENTS

- Rockmelon
- Honeydew melon
- Seedless watermelon
- Mint sprigs a large bunch
- Apple juice 2 litres
- Soda water 2 litres

#### METHOD

Using a melon baller, scoop melon flesh into balls and place into a large jug with any juice. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Add 3 cups of ice and mint. Top with apple juice and soda water. Stand for 5 minutes to allow flavours to develop, then serve.

Halve or quarter the fruit and soda water/juice for a smaller batch. **†**

Final drop off by 3pm on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> December please, to allow for collection by the Mission and then distribution to families in our city.










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## **Garage Sale**

At the Preview Evening drinks and nibbles event on Friday evening before the 'Big Day', a sumptuous array of cheeses, paté, and fresh crusty bread was laid out beautifully by Sue and Fiona, with wine and juice being served through our new kitchen hatch.

A fantastic arrangement of jams and preserves greeted everyone as they walked through the door, to peruse the Antiques and High End Furniture. For the first time, this year we added the Toy stall to those opening early, and all were very well received and patronised.

Thanks to the generosity of Siso Bar and Eatery and New World Remuera, we held a special raffle with a limited number of tickets. First Prize, a \$200 voucher at Siso, was won by Anette, and the second prize gift hamper from New World, was won by Sue's daughter and accepted by her mum.

Approximately 80 people were in attendance over the course of the evening, and a total of \$5,462 was raised on the night, a tremendous start to our fundraising efforts!

#### Sale Day

As is always the case, there was a big line up of people waiting to come in as soon as the doors opened, some arriving as early as the first volunteers! As we approached 8am there were lots of last minute adjustments to stalls as everyone prepared for the flood of people.

Although things settled down a little following the initial rush, all stall holders were kept busy, busy, busy, right across the morning. Huge volumes of bargain sale items were carried out the door, with three eftpos machines running hot.

Our thanks to New World Remuera and Baker's Delight for donating sausages and bread for the barbecue. The smell of frying sausages wafting in the air, and Amelie's singing as she played guitar, gave a great festival feel to the day, with lots of people staying in the forecourt to talk while enjoying the food and music.

As the morning wore on and sales gradually slowed, the hard work of clean up began. Leftover items were packed up ready for collection by the ATWC, City Mission, and Salvation Army. As much as possible of what couldn't be given away was subsequently sold elsewhere or recycled.

After the 'final siren' there continued to be funds trickling in for several weeks, and the end result, including preview sales, was over \$43,000.

### Young Adults' Pilgrimage to Iona and Assisi

I have too many highlights from Scotland so I'm cheating and saying that my highlight was getting to experience Iona as a 'thin place.' For context, the Isle of Iona is often referred to as a 'thin place,' an idea in Celtic theology where the border between the divine and earth is permeable. While there, I was blessed with three particularly magical 'thin' moments. The first was getting to see dolphins jump around and play in the wake of our boat while on the way back from visiting Staffa (an even smaller island - home

to Fingal's Cave). The second was climbing up Dun I (Iona's tallest fairy hill/mount) with Izzy to visit the Well of Eternal Youth and being greeted with the most vibrant rainbow I've ever seen. The third was relishing in the back of the Aurora Borealis with the rest of the Abbey's pilgrims on our final night on the isle - was the most perfect send-off! Each of these moments left me in total awe of God's creation and divine presence in the world and will be etched in my heart for the rest of my life (I'm getting emotional just thinking about them!)

I was unfortunately ill in Italy, so my time there had a sickly green fog over it. However, on our

final night in Assisi, we held a service in the chapel of the monastery we were staying in. I hadn't been able to partake in the day's group activity, so this was my first time back with the whole gang. It was a really beautiful and intimate service that we patched together with the guidance of Sarah (our token priest on the trip!) The fact that Sarah is officially the first woman Anglican priest to have held a service in that chapel (which is notably Catholic) made it extra special. **†**

This was a journey that was absolutely worth it. To have been able to travel to places like Iona and Assisi was amazing and by the end of it, we all wished it had been just a bit longer. At first, Iona looked and felt a bit like being on another island somewhere around New Zealand, with a strong wind the day we arrived, with sheep and cows roaming the fields, but once I walked inside the Abbey it became clear that this was a special place. Within the Abbey, you got a sense of the history of the place and the uniqueness of being in a place like this on the other side of the world. Throughout our week at Iona we learned more and more about the significance of all the sites on the island, including St Columba Bay and the Iona Nunnery, as our leader for the week, Alistair McIntosh,



seemed to have a story for just about every place on the island. The experience was made all the better by living in community with others from around world, journeying with one another learning about the significance of the land that lay before us. This allowed us to have many conversations with those journeying with us, and provide encouragement to each other in the various ministries that each of us are engaged in.

> By the end of our time on Iona, it was difficult to leave as we didn't want it to end, but it allowed us to have the time to refresh and be encouraged by the experience that Iona had been.

Assisi was just as exciting. You knew you were in a one of kind place when you would wake up, open the curtain, and just see a basilica only meters away, with fog covering the valley below. Being a city on a hill, it did mean a bit more strain on the legs, but that was all forgotten once you entered all the sites that Assisi has to offer. The basilica's were incredible to walk through and take in all that was within. From the artwork to the items held, these were places that you could easily spend a whole day inside. While in Assisi, we were also able to travel

just outside of the city, to Eremo delle Carceri. To get there meant either taking a taxi or walking uphill for about an hour or more. I choose to do the walk which turned out to be tougher than we thought as it was mostly uphill on a steep track with no places to sit and rest. Once we made it up, we found a retreat away from the business of the city, with quiet and scenic walks through the forest as well as many little huts and caves to explore. With only three days in Assisi, I was surprised at how much I was able to see and do, but it definitely felt worth it by the end of our time there.

This experience was one that was just amazing. Being able to visit these places, learn the history, and meet the people in both Iona and Assisi is something that I won't forget in a hurry, if at all. Thank you to all the people that helped to make this experience possible and I hope that I may be able to go back and visit again sometime in the future. **†**

Kia ora e te whānau. First of all, a huge mihi (thanks) goes to the St John's College Trust Board for funding the majority of this trip, as well as various donations from parish members and those who came to support our market last year.

  3-4 Oct Glasglow
  4-11 Oct Iona
  11-13 Oct Edinburgh
  13-14 Oct Florence
  14-17 Oct Assisi
  17-19 Oct Rome
  19-20 Oct London
- 20-22 Oct flying home via Singapore

As we gathered at the Auckland airport and I was saying goodbye to my parents, I was definitely nervous! I had been lucky enough to also go travelling in August, predominantly by myself, so what was travelling as a group of ten going to be like? I was also not looking forward to more long-haul flights haha!!

Happily, all worries were washed away once the real travel began in Scotland. It took us one short bus ride, one long bus ride, one long ferry, another long bus ride and then a short ferry to get from Glasglow to Iona, which meant we were straight into another day of travel after our long flights. However, it was not only worth the final destination, but the Scottish landscape was stunning! It certainly looks like a place where I could happily live, perhaps in a little cottage right in the middle of a forest.

We spent a week on the Isle of Iona, learning from not only Alastair McIntosh, our facilitator for the week, but also from the other pilgrims who were staying at the Abbey. It was a strange experience to feel like the week was not only a very long time but also a very short time. We all had different experiences across the week, as we individually took up different opportunities for group activities, such as various walking pilgrimages across the Isle, trips to the Iona Community bookshop, and a boat trip to Staffa. We had shared meals and two church services a day together, which meant we both started and finished the day in the same way. Huge thanks to all of the volunteers at the Abbey who took care of us and ensured that we were fed throughout our time there.

I enjoyed Alastair's discussions around "Pilgrimage of Life", and also his reflections on the importance on climate change. From the Iona website, on the page advertising our week, Alastair said, "Climate change is the most pressing physical problem that the whole world currently faces. But what are its deeper roots? Is it sufficient to face it at the conventional levels of science, politics and economics, or does it also require insights into the human condition that only deep psychology and a profound spirituality can offer? The Russian writer Maxim Gorky said "All of us are pilgrims on this earth. I have even heard it said that the earth itself is a pilgrim in the heavens." How does ecological theology help to understand this, and how might an understanding of our own lives as pilgrims help to inform, and to sustain, the vocations called for from us in these times? Above all, however, how can we not let these times go to waste, but let God use them to deepen our own spirituality and, perhaps, that of the world on its pilgrimage through time? During this week we will reflect together on the words of both a former Iona Abbey warden and in the experience of the Columban monks that Saint Adomnan recorded: "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death"."

Throughout the whole trip, quite a few of us kept journals, and many also wrote notes during our sessions with Alastair. Below are a few things I noted in my journal:

- ✤ Never underestimate where you're at on your pilgrimage of life
- What matters most is not if you succeed or fail but the journey you take and how you grow through it and build up your courage.
- ✤ Be open to being led in a different direction.
- Human change, not climate change.
- ✤ Let your spiritual life lead you, not consumerism.
- Every moment of life is a blessing God is in the little flowers, so take the time to notice the little things.

I love what my fellow pilgrim, Steph, said as well: "Pilgrimage is about journeying with God, with a view to discovering more through challenge and exploration. The journey is almost more important than the destination, though there is much to discover through both."

Iona was a truly magical place - one where we all felt the presence of God and the beauty that the whenua (land) held. We had also created beautiful relationships with a bunch of the other pilgrims who were with us all week, so it was sad to be departing Iona and also these other epic humans. Luckily, we've been able to keep in contact via WhatsApp.

Our next main destination was Assisi, home of St Francis and St Clare. I have a particular fondness for St Francis as he is the saint of animals and the environment - two very special things to me! As we were driving up to Assisi on our bus, I was in awe, watching us get closer and closer to the city on the hill. It looked magnificent, and to be completely honest, I felt like it was a movie set! The buildings were stunning, and everyone seemed to make an effort with how their houses looked, with luscious greenery scattered around the city. My favourite spot was the Eremo delle Carceri, which is a hermitage complex where St Francis and his friends used to go and pray. Although I loved all the gorgeous buildings throughout Assisi (which contained amazing and often huge paintings beyond anything I've ever seen), the hermitage felt the most special. I already knew I connected with God in nature, but this trip certainly highlighted that for me!

Anyway, I could go on and on about the trip (feel free to come and talk to me about it)... But I will end with saying a HUGE thank you to Sarah, the leader of our Community of Ordinary Saints group, for all of her organisation. She did a massive job pulling this trip together, and I so appreciate all the mahi (work) that went into it. She had also organized a lovely dinner with her Godfather in Edinburgh, and it was so nice to have a homecooked meal in the middle of the trip, so thanks goes to Robin for hosting all ten of us!

This was truly a trip of a lifetime. **†**


Our final meeting for the year will be our Christmas celebration and carols on Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> December. **†**
